




NSE is a low-cost academic program that provides WCU students the opportunity to study for a semester or a year at another member institution. With more than 170 participating institutions, WCU



Join us for an exclusive public lecture and book signing by Michael Wolraich, author of the new critically acclaimed book, The Bishop and the Butterfly: Murder, Politics, and the End of Jazz Age. He relates the incredible history of New York in the Roaring 20s, famous for excess—from drunken

revelries to brutal gang wars. The city's appalling corruption is less well-known. In 1930, a state investigation uncovered a shocking NYPD conspiracy to frame innocent women for sex crimes. One of the whistle-blowers, a prostitute and blackmailer named Vivian Gordon, was strangled to death days after meeting with investigators. Wolraich's book recounts the gripping murder investigation and its explosive consequences—revealing a trail of corruption that led all the way to the mayor's office. #### The Heat - Cold Illness Complex in Niger: The Quest for Balance and Well-Being in a Turbulent World Philips Autograph Library

Sponsored by the Museum of Anthropology and Archaeology in conjunction with its exhibition, "Surrounded by the Spirits: Paul Stoller and the Songhay Journey Towards Well-Being," this talk by Scott Youngstedt, Professor of Anthropology at Saganaw State University examines wellbeing in Niger. The most common health problems in Niger involve an illness complex centered around the imbalance between "heat" and "cold." Dr. Youngstedt's discussion of heat – cold will illustrate gender divisions and complementarity as well as ideas about sexuality; show that diffuse understandings of the etiologies and symptoms and overall complexity of heat - cold necessitate pluralistic therapeutic approaches; and argue that prevalence of heat — cold illnesses plays an important part in the endurance of the traditional medical sector. A second retrospective gallery looks at the life of Stoller, who trained as a Songhay sorcerer's apprentice, and is the author of nearly 15 books and the recipient of numerous awards including the Anders Retzius Medal given by the King of Sweden, the highest honor in anthropology. The closing reception follows a lecture by Dr. Scott Youngstedt, an expert on Niger's Hausa culture, at 3:30 in Philips Autograph Library. 
