## **SUMMER PRACTICUM**

The B.S. Criminal Justice program requires participation in, and payment for, a 12-credit summer practicum (CRJ 490) taken in the summer following students' junior or senior years. During this capstone experience, the practicum student will be required to work 37.5 hours per week for 12 weeks at an approved criminal justice or related agency, and students are not typically compensated. Students are encouraged to plan carefully in anticipation of having to complete the program requirements, as well as pay for the 12-credit load. Working with financial aid during the year prior to participation in the practicum is strongly advised. Students are encouraged to share information regarding the practicum requirement with anyone who might be contributing toward their college expenses.

Because of the 12-credit summer practicum, many students are able to complete their degrees a semester early. It is recommended that students meet regularly with academic advisors to complete their degrees in a timely manner.
